# HISTORY IN A GLASS: 2019 FLAGSHIPS UNVEILED



OR THE WINE LOVERS AMONG us, there's something romantic about drinking wine sourced from gnarly old vines. Thoughts are conjured of vintages gone by as you swirl the wine in the glass.

Old vines are part of the DNA here at Best's, with our historic vineyards making small parcels of wine that speak loudly of our Great Western home. Few wineries in Australia can lay claim to vines that are more than 150 years old, but our Concongella vineyards possess so many stories, like our prized Thomson Family Shiraz.

First made in 1992 as Thomson Centenary Shiraz, 100 years after the Thomson family settled in the area, this iconic wine is made predominantly from the 15 rows of Shiraz planted by Henry Best in 1868. Only available in exceptional years, this wine is a special part of Australian viticultural history and deserves its acclaimed 'Exceptional' status in the prestigious Langton's Classification. It's now time for you to enjoy the 2019 release of this flagship, only the 17th time this wine has been made.

Equally significant is our Bin No. 0 Great Western Shiraz. Produced from four low-yielding blocks of our Concongella vineyard, this wine is also internationally recognised as one of Victoria's finest.



Both new wines hail from the exceptional 2019 vintage; a warm, dry growing season where the vines ripened quickly, despite crops being lower than average. Some early rain in February gave the vines a well-deserved drink and refreshed them before harvest. Slightly lower yields resulted in more concentrated wines, and their perfume and persistence will last for years to come.

Stop and savour every sip now, or test your patience by putting some of these remarkable wines down in your cellar – they will need a little time to reveal their true characters. We hope you enjoy the 2019 release of our flagship wines.



**Did you know?** The 15 rows of Shiraz vines were planted by Henry Best, who recorded them as 'Hermitage' in his daily journal. Today, the clone is referred to by the CSIRO as the Concongella clone, or the Best's Old Block clone. It is the mother clone of all subsequent Shiraz plantings at Best's Great Western.

#### 2019 THOMSON FAMILY SHIRAZ

This wine is given the royal treatment, named among Australia's finest wines and rated as 'Exceptional' in the Langton's Classification of Australian Wine VII. Made from the original 1868 Shiraz plantings, and only produced in exceptional years, it was meticulously hand-harvested, hand plunged and then fermented in small, open fermenters. This 2019 vintage will take some time to reveal its true character, but displays a rich tapestry of deeply scented aromas with dark fruits, rose petals and grilled nuts. Medium bodied, with a first-class

#### 2019 BIN NO O. SHIRAZ

This is a clear collector's favourite, particularly among our wine club members. Sourced from four low-yielding blocks of the historic Concongella Vineyard in Great Western, this wine is an undisputed icon and will reward short-term cellaring. The 2019 vintage is pure and intense, with a palate dancing full of plush black and blue fruits, drawn in with a long, poised tannin structure and aftertaste.

# A FRUITFUL HARVEST: --VINTAGE 2022--





here's always something of a challenge thrown to the winemaking and viticultural team as

they respond to the calls of Mother Nature each harvest. While we can meticulously prune the vines and sustainably nurture our historic vineyards, so many elements remain outside our control.

The 2022 vintage will go down in the history books as particularly memorable. It was shaping up to be quite fruitful, but last December, just as the vines were looking pristine during budburst, we were struck by a freak hailstorm at a magnitude never before seen in the region. Sadly, it caused damage to the fruit and vines, including the Concongella vineyards surrounding the winery, which typically produce the Thomson Family Shiraz and Pinot Meunier. As a result, we'll see half as much Riesling this year than in 2021, with much lower yields across the board.

Our Sugarloaf Creek vineyard, however, is paying dividends by helping to diversify our choice of vineyard sites. We think of it like an insurance policy, and this year it was beneficial because the hail did not pass through that section of Great Western. Nonetheless, the quality of the 2022 fruit, particularly the reds, is looking superb and the team is working together to make the best of the crop.

We started picking in February, with many hands on deck to make some exceptional wines. This year Jacob Parton, our Assistant Winemaker is leading the charge although vintage remains a family affair, with the whole team chipping in to play a part. Ben and Hamish Thomson remain hands on, with sixth-generation Isabelle Brady working her second vintage along with Ben's stepson, Jackson. Pete, our resident cellar hand has some help from Tristan and Annie from Cellar Door is proving handy in the vineyards and the lab. Plus we have some additional guidance and experience from Steve Flamsteed, former Gourmet Traveller WINE Winemaker of the Year.

# Red Wine Braised Short Ribs

#### WITH CREAMY POLENTA & STUFFED ASPARAGUS

Who doesn't love the culinary genius that is Thomas Keller? His famed French Laundry restaurant in California's Napa Valley has long been a bucket list experience for sixth generation James Thomson, Hamish's son.

This delicious recipe is an adaptation from an original Thomas Keller recipe, one that James Thomson has refined over the years. It takes a little time to prepare this red wine braised short ribs meal, but if you're looking for the perfect accompaniment for a Best's Bin No. 0 Shiraz, this is the dish!

#### DAY ONE

Prepare the meat and marinade. Place the meat and marinade together in the fridge for 12 to 16 hours.

#### DAY TWO

Cook the meat in a pan then transfer to the oven. Let the meat cool and then refrigerate overnight.

#### DAY THREE

Cook the meat in a saucepot and transfer to a sauté pan. Prepare the creamy polenta and sauteed asparagus. You're now ready to entertain. Pull out your favourite Best's wine, welcome your guests and enjoy!

#### 2021 GREAT WESTERN RIESLING

"This is a ripping 'rizza'. It's light straw in colour with flashes of pale gold. A solid swirl reveals aromas of lemon curd and lime zest with the florally fragrant lift of lemon blossom and honeysuckle. There's also a beguiling summer sniff of rain on a hot slate stone path. In the mouth there's a full-frontal flush of citrus flavours with a lively line of acid leading to a lingering and satisfying finish. We enjoyed our bottle with a Thai yellow curry a fantastic combination. Top stuff this!"

"Beautiful Shiraz, medium to full bodied full mouthfeel. Dark fruits, plums and blackberry. There is such a harmonious balance to this wine, seductive smooth and moreish. Not a hair out of place! # THE WORLD'S OLDEST -- PINOT VINES?--



Pinot Noir was first planted in our Nursery Block in 1868, believed to have come from the James Busby collection, Australia's first vines. These Pinot Noir cuttings were sourced from some of the finest vineyards in Burgundy, which were subsequently wiped out due to phylloxera. The original Best's plantings are now thought to be the oldest Pinot Noir vines in the world.

# What's the difference between Noir & Meunier?

Pinot Meunier is wine's version of the third member of that 1980s pop band whose name no one can remember. Closely related to Pinot Noir – it's a mutation from cloning – the red grape's main claim to fame is that it's the third grape variety allowed in Champagne, alongside Chardonnay and Pinot Noir. It's also one of the oldest grape varieties growing at Best's Wines, with a 1.2-hectare vineyard first planted in 1868.

Pinot Meunier can boldly grow where no vine has gone before! Its superpower is that it suits sites where it's too cold for Chardonnay and Pinot Noir, and because it ripens sooner, it can be an insurance policy grape during hard vintages. Perhaps that's what Henry Best had in mind when he planted the vines along the Concongella Creek just a year before Best's began producing its first vintage.

For a long time, the team at Best's called it Miller's Burgundy. Blended with other grapes, it helps soften the palate, but Pinot Meunier also has its own distinct flavours. It shows a lot of similar flavours and aromas to its sibling, Pinot Noir, but has higher acidity with more citrus characters and a lighter, less earthy profile. It can also display slightly cigar-smoky flavours. But the surprising thing for such a prevalent grape is how rarely it's bottled as a single varietal.

#### 2021 YOUNG VINE PINOT MEUNIER

This unique wine comes from our 'Young Vine' plantings of Pinot Meunier, which were established in 1970 – a century after our "old vine" plantings, and grown from cuttings of those original vines. It has expressive aromas of fresh cherries, blood orange, toasted sourdough and warm spices, with crunchy red fruits, and a smooth and slippery finish.

#### 2021 OLD VINE PINOT MEUNIER

The Millers Burgundy vineyard, first planted in 1868, is made up of mostly Pinot Meunier and a little Pinot Noir. This unique vineyard block is treated with meticulous care and, in good vintages, this block is made into a 'single vineyard' wine. Intense, brooding and focused, it has plush red fruits with savoury and silky tannins. The core remains for a long finish. It's still very young and needs time to express its full potential.

#### 2021 GREAT WESTERN PINOT NOIR

Guaranteed to please any lover of Pinot Noir! It was sourced from 1980 and 1987 Pinot Noir plantings in the Concongella vineyards at Best's Great Western and

the 1997 plantings at our elevated Salvation Hills vineyard at Rhymney. A slightly more fragrant and upfront wine than the previous vintage, it is savoury with a lovely roundness on the palate. It's harmonious and just so drinkable.

Sustainability has long been a core focus at the winery, and these new technologies add to the many measures they are implementing to give back to their special sites.
